#### **Background**

The FreeSchools World Literacy (FSWL) mission provides free education to women and children, with the vision to end the cycles of ignorance and poverty. To this end, we focus on students' literacy skills, income-generating skills for young women, and continuing education for our teachers.

Our primary goal is to offer free and basic education to help children gain a foundation in the Hindi language and develop beginning literacy and math skills. Our students come from urban areas and villages, who might not otherwise attend school. Often their families have little to no literacy skills and may only speak the local languages and dialects. Hindi, however, is the official language of Bihar and the government-sponsored schools. One of our objectives is to prepare students for more formal education in established standard schools.

We assist young women to develop incoming-producing skills by learning to sew, by hand and

sewing machine, to crochet, knit, and embroider.

Presently we have a total of twenty-eight programs: eleven schools in or near the city of Motihari and 17 schools in or near Bettiah. This is only two programs less than the 30 schools we sponsored in pre-Covid-19 days.

### **Sister Crescence Shares the Emergency Relief Efforts**

2021 cannot be called a normal year! With Covid-19 emergency lockdowns and devastating floods, the teachers aided by Sr. Crescence, Nitesh, and a few area coordinators, initiated humanitarian efforts along with teaching their students. When the lockdown prevented classes to gather, lessons were sometimes delivered to a student's home. Teachers' monthly meetings were held as regularly as covid regulations permitted.

As in most countries, the Covid-19 lockdowns prevented many parents, from our school communities, from working. Buying food, even if they had money (and many did not) was complicated given lockdown conditions. The exceptionally heavy seasonal rains generated floods in many villages, adding to an already difficult situation. Between illness, lack of food, and lack of clean water, most homes experienced the loss of loved ones.

In separate fundraising efforts, led by Saskia Raevouri, and helped by Service to Humanity and FreeSchools World Literacy, funds were raised to provide food and later food and clothing for the families impacted by the pandemic and nature.



Our FreeSchool teachers whole-heartily co-operated by identifying families in need, preparing and distributing food packets and later food and clothing packets. The food packets consisted of rice, potatoes, lentils (dhal), flour, onions, spices, and cooking oil.

250 packets of food were distributed during the first round of the covid relief efforts, and 400 were distributed in the second wave of covid relief.

#### Flood Relief Assistance

Our teachers surveyed the community and chose 120 families in "dire need", having lost most of their household items to the flood. Along with food, families received one-bed sheet, two pillowcases, one blanket, one shawl, and one ladies' sari. Sr. Crescence wrote, "We wish we could have done more."
